For transition teams seeking resources about school to adult life transition, key areas to explore include transition planning guides, disability-specific transition resources, information on relevant agencies, Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS), vocational training programs, independent living skills development curricula, and support groups for young adults transitioning from school to adulthood. The focus should be on individualized plans that consider each person's unique strengths, interests, goals, and needs.

Key Considerations for Transition Teams

- **Team Membership:** Ensure that all transition team members are invited to attend and given transition-related information in preferred languages and formats. They must also know and understand their role.
- Close Collaboration: Engage with the student, families, schools, case managers, community agencies, healthcare providers, and other relevant stakeholders throughout the transition process.
- Shared Knowledge and Expertise: All team members add value. Students and parents/caregivers must be equal members of the team.
- **Start Early:** Begin transition planning early in middle school to ensure adequate preparation for adulthood.
- Advocacy: Assist students and families in navigating and accessing complex systems and services.

Transition from School to Adulthood

The transition from school to adult life begins in Indiana at age 14 or in 8th grade. Students with a disability who have an individualized education program (IEP) and their support team begin focusing on the student's postschool education, employment, and independent living goals. This support team tailors services and supports to enable individuals to students maximum independence and thrive in their communities.

Competitive Integrated Employment

Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE) is work that is performed on a full-time or part-time basis for which an individual is:

- Compensated at or above minimum wage and comparable to the customary rate paid by the employer to employees without disabilities performing similar duties and with similar training and experience.
- Receiving the same level of benefits provided to other employees without disabilities in similar positions.
- At a location where the employee interacts with other individuals without disabilities and is given the same advancement opportunities as other employees without disabilities in similar positions.
